THE SEVENTH REPORT

OF THE

DEPUTY KEEPER OF THE PUBLIC RECORDS IN IRELAND.

TO HIS GRACE, JAMES, DUKE OF ABERCORN, K.G., 1

LORD LIEUTENANT-GENERAL AND GENERAL GOVERNOR OF IRELAND.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR GRACE,

1. The removal of the bulk of the Records which, at the time Removal of of the passing of the Public Records (Ireland) Act, 1867, were of original bulk of records substanthe age of twenty years and upwards from the making, has now tially combeen substantially completed. The only noticeable portions still pleted. left outstanding are the Judgment Rolls of the Courts of Common Law, that part of the Prerogative Collection comprising the Wills proved since the year 1820, and a portion of the State Paper

Collection (post, 5), in process of preparation for transfer.

2. As regards the Common Law Judgment Rolls, I beg leave to Outstanding refer to my former reports, and in particular to the letter of the Common Law Right Honorable the Master of the Rolls, dated 14th May, 1870, Rolls, calling the attention of Her Majesty's Judges of the Courts of [III. App. 4; Common Law to the circumstances under which the removal to Common Law to the circumstances under which the removal to this office of the Judgment Rolls had been temporarily suspended, and to the expediency of framing rules for their treatment after removal. As they are Records of much public importance, I beg leave to refer to a note of their present places of custody, which App. I. will be found in the Appendix.

3. A sufficiently long experience tends to show that no Outstanding sensible inconvenience to the administration of the Court of wills. Probate need be apprehended from the removal of the residue of the Wills to 1846, inclusive, so, that the Warrant already issued for that purpose will probably be carried into complete execution

during the current year.

4. The collections, by the removal of which to this office, during the past year, the primary work remaining to be done in execution of section 4 of the Act, has thus been completed, are the following.

a. Records of the High Court of Admiralty .- A portion of Court of these, which had been deposited in the Chancery Recognizance Admiraty. Office, formerly occupied by the Marshal of the Admiralty Court, [I. 63.] had been already removed to this office. The residue was deposited in presses in the present Court of Admiralty, and in the offices of the Queen's Proctor. Owing to the former practice of

transacting the administrative business of this Court at the private residences of the officials, the Records now remaining are of trifling bulk and little importance, as compared with the extent and antiquity of the jurisdiction. The removal was affected under the direction of Mr. Berry, to whose report I beg leave to refer.

App. II.

Court of Exchequer. Revenue and Equity sides.

b. Records of the Court of Revenue Exchequer, and Equity Exchequer.—The Records of the Revenue Exchequer, completing the series to the year 1848, from the respective dates up to which they had already been removed to this office, from the Custom House and Bencher's Buildings, had remained deposited in a vault beneath the Offices of the Receiver Master in Chancery. In the same vault were deposited a miscellaneous collection of Replications, Rejoinders, and other documents from the Filacer's Office of the late Court of Equity Exchequer. The laborious duty of transferring the contents of this vault was committed to Mr. James H. Davies, and performed by him between the 11th and 21st May last.

d. Records of Chancery from the offices of J. J. Murphy, Esq., formerly Master in Chancery.-Under the operation of the Master Murphy. Chancery (Ireland) Act, 1867, and of several Orders of the Lord Chancellor and of the Lords Commissioners of the Great Seal, the Records relating to the several causes depending in Chancery at the date of the first Order had been concentrated in the offices of Master Brooke, Master Murphy, and the Receiver Master; and those pertaining to the jurisdiction of Master Brooke having been disposed of, by transfer to this office, and to that of Master Murphy, so that, for the purposes of section 4 of the Act, the latter office had come to be the ultimate repository of all the outstanding Cause Papers of the Court of Chancery, an order was made by the Lords Commissioners of the Great Seal, dated 4th July, 1874, whereby Masters Brooke and Murphy were released from their duties as such Masters, from and after the 8th of August next ensuing; and it was thereby directed that all the business then transacted in the offices of the said two Masters, which consisted in the passing of the accounts of Receivers, Guardians, and Committees of the estates of lunatics, and in the management of the estates wherewith they are entrusted, should, from and after the 8th of August then next, be transferred to the office of the Receiver Master, and that all other business then appertaining to the said two offices should, from and after the said date, be transferred to the Cham-Warrants having been already bers of the Lords Commissioners. issued for the removal of the Records, comprised in the 4th section of the Act, from the offices of the respective Masters, directions were given to proceed with Master Murphy's collections on the 20th of August. This duty, involving much detail of arrangement, separation, and redeposit, was confided to Mr. Henry Cox, by whom it was satisfactorily completed on the 20th October. collection removed comprises the Cause Papers, and ancillary documents, chiefly of a date prior to 1850, in 2,960 causes, leaving

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the documents of a later date in 3,480 causes, in their former re-It not being possible to determine beforehand which of Residue of these latter causes should be deemed current business, to be left Cause Papers under the immediate control of the Receiver Master and Chief Clerk (Chancery) left unremoved. respectively, it has been considered that the intention of the Act would be best carried into effect, consistently with the convenience of the Court, by leaving the last-mentioned portions of the collection, newly labelled and indexed, under Mr. Cox's

direction, in the custody of the Chief Clerk of the Court.

e. Ecclesiastical Collections of the Diocese of Clonfert and Ecclesiastical Kilmacduagh.—The 4th section of the Act, vesting in the Master collections, of the Rolls the Records of any Court which shall have ceased to Aughrim Rectory. exist, rendered it my duty on some former occasions to remove to this office various collections of diocesan and other ecclesiastical documents, preserved at the private residences of the Custodians. The last collection of this nature of the existence of which I have been made aware, was at Aughrim, in the County of Galway, under the charge of the Reverend John F. T. Crampton, A.M., Registrar of the United Diocese of Clonfert and Kilmacduagh. These comprised, together with testamentary, matrimonial, and diocesan matter, some documents relating to Church property for which I hold myself accountable to the Church Temporalities Commissioners. The collection was removed to this office on the 17th of September.

5. The Keeper of the State Papers in his annual Report, which Record Tower, will be found in the Appendix, has given a detail of the operations Dublin Castle. now in progress, and nearly completed, at the Record Tower, for App. VII. placing the residue of the State Papers in the same complete form of arrangement and accessibility as the portions already transmitted. . . Although these preparations did not admit of further removal of the State Paper series in the past year, the Keeper has sent to this office a collection of other Records, some of which are of no inferior interest to any hitherto transmitted. I refer particularly to the series of 139 folio volumes, containing the proceedings of the Trustees for the Encouragement of the Linen Manufactures in Ireland from the year 1711 to 1828. Considering the great past and present extent of the linen trade in this country, these Records of the first systematic steps, taken by public authority, for its regulation and development, possess a high interest for the historian and economist. It has been thought well to present in the Appendix an abstract of the first day's proceedings of the App. VIII. Board reciting the deed by which the original trustees for the

respective provinces were appointed. 6. In conformity with the practice adopted in my former Reports of giving the number of pieces constituting each consignment, I annex a like return for the past year, which may be regarded as having witnessed the completion of the primary

The primary work with which the office is charged having Future operabeen thus substantially accomplished, it may be convenient to tions under sec. advert to the future duties which will be imposed on me and my successors by the 14th section of the Act. Under this latter enactment, the Records of all Courts or Public Offices in Ireland, after the passing of the Act (12th August, 1867) are placed under the care and charge of the Right Hon. the Master of the Rolls, for ultimate transmission to this office, as they shall respectively become twenty years old from the making; and this enactment is not limited as in the English Record Act, to particular courts 1 & 2 Vic., c. 94. or offices specified by name, but is general in its operation. will depend on the means of supervision and correspondence placed at the disposal of this office, how far it may be enabled to carry the intention of the Act in this respect into operation. beginning has been made in the case of the District Registries of the Court of Probate, in which, with the approval of the Right Honorable the Judge, the old method of putting up Wills and other Testamentary Instruments in bundles has been discontinued, and the system of separate envelopes of a uniform size for future transmission to this office has been adopted. Uniformity, in size and method, of Record-keeping, in all public offices, would be one of the most effective means towards economy of space and facility of reference in the future central deposits contemplated by the Act; and as far as the facilities at the disposal of this office

for the conduct of a necessarily extended correspondence will admit, no endeavour will be wanting to effect those important objects.

Accruing Increment, Chancery. App. IX.

8. The increment, over and above the original bulk, hitherto accruing under the last mentioned section of the Act has been chiefly derived from the Court of Chancery. In the Appendix will be found the detail of the several Records transferred from thence to this custody from time to time during the past year.

9. The diminished amount of extern duty has been attended with a corresponding increase in the intern work of arrangement The accompanying diagram indicates in red the several changes effected in the Treasury during the year, the general nature and object of which has been to concentrate in the newly-fitted bays, in perfectly fire-proof fittings, and finally complete arrangement, the several collections which were deposited. in the first instance, in bulk, as received, on the wooden shelving of the original fittings.

10. The new fittings have been erected pari passu with the

preparation for the ultimate intern deposits, and have been extended during the year through bays 1 S, 1 T, 1 U. The Cause Paper collections of the Offices in Chancery have been brought from their first place of deposit in the basement, and are now being incorporated with the fresh accretions, consequent on the Arrangement of abolition of the Masters' Offices, in preparation for ultimate de-This process of interpolation must posit in self-indexing series. go on until the last of the outstanding documents shall have come in, when the entire collection will be capable of final deposit. The other collections of Deeds Boxes, &c., which were originally placed in the basement, owing to the large demand on the accommodation in the Upper Treasury for the reception of the first bulky consignments, have also been removed, so as to make room for

The other intern work of the year has consisted in the usual operations of Deposit, Indexing, Calendaring, and supplying the requirements of the public in inspections and compared copies of Records. In the deposit of the Chancery Pleadings, space was left, in the respective series of Bills and Answers, for the introduction of the unindexed portion of the collection, anterior to 1624, kept Ancient Plead- formerly on files and known as "Ancient Pleadings." These, having been cleansed and flattened, have now been subjected to regular arrangement by date and series, which has proceeded through twelve bundles, but will necessarily be a tedious business, as the documents range back to the reign of Henry VIII.,

Mr. Cox has prepared a Calendar, by dates, titles of causes, Writs, &c., of and names of lands affected, with Index, of the Writs and Com-perambulation. missions for Perambulation, Returns thereto, and Maps; also of the Writs for the examination of Married Women and Returns Examination of thereto, transferred from the Record and Writ Office of the Court married women. of Chancery at the time of the original removal of its Records.

d. Mr. Berry has prepared an Index to the MS. Calendar of Mem. Rolls, the Memoranda Rolls of James I. and Charles I., transferred in James I.

1870 from the Offices of the Master of the Court of Exchequer.

e. The Calendar of Disentailing Deeds has been advanced from Disentailing Deed 2,872, enrolled 23rd June, 1854, to Deed 3,174, enrolled Deed Roll.

f. A Calendar and Index have been prepared by Mr. Mills, under the direction of Mr. LaTouche, the Assistant Deputy Keeper, to the Fiants of Henry VIII. A MS. Calendar and Index "Fiants" Nominum was already in existence, but as it indicates the nature of Henry VIII. of each Fiant only as Grant, Lease, Pardon, &c., it has been found too general to be of any substantial service. These Records, named "Fiants," from the initial words of one class of the instruments so known—"Fiant literæ patentes,"—are of great value as constituting the primary authority for grants under the great seal. grants, subsequent to 1665, had to be enrolled in Chancery as a condition to their validity, and the enrolments so made, where the Rolls have been preserved, dispense with the evidence of the Fiants; but, for Grants before that date, there was no certainty that any transcript would be found on the Roll, and in point of fact, great numbers of Letters Patent of early date remain unenrolled. To these Grants the Fiants afford the primary and, in most cases, the only clue accessible to the public, and sometimes, where the original letters are lost, to those representing the The importance of framing a well-indexed calendar of their contents has long been acknowledged, and it is hoped that this work, now completed for the reign of Henry VIII., will be found so far to supply all that is necessary. Considering the value of the work, it has been thought well to embody it in the Appendix to this Report; and it is proposed to continue it Appendix X. in like Appendices to future Reports, until the whole period shall be covered up to the point where the information already published by the Irish Record Commissioners will make such aid unnecessary.

g. An Index has been made to the Dublin Consistorial Grant Dublin Grant Book, 1746-9, in which the volume was previously defective.

14. Twenty volumes of the Testamentary series have been rebound. Two thousand three hundred and twenty-five membranes of Plea Rolls up to Roll 177 have been cleansed and flattened. I defer the further repair, by transparent tissue, till after the completion of endeavours to restore the faded ink, in which many experiments have been made without definite result. One hundred and seven Pleadings of the Equity Exchequer, and one hundred and forty-seven other Records of various kinds have been repaired.

15. From the Table of Fees annexed, it will be seen that the supply of certified copies to the public continues to increase. The amount for 1874 is £622 11s. 6d. as against £545 8s. 6d. for 1873.

APPENDIX II.

EXTRACT from REPORT of HENRY F. BERRY, esq., on the removal of the RECORDS of the COURT of ADMIRALTY.

The Records of the High Court of Admiralty, now in this department, were transferred from three repositories, viz. —a small room formerly used as Marshal's office, and which, at the time its contents were entered in our Transfer Books, belonged to the Chancery Recognizance Office; the Chamber which forms the present Court, and the offices of J. F. Hamerton, esq., the Queen's Proctor, at 61 Upper Sackville-street.

In former years, there was no fixed room for use as a Court, nor had the officials any offices for the transaction of business, with the exception of the small room above named, which, for a short time, was used by the Marshal. The officials discharged their duties at their own private residences, and so, in one instance, a quantity of documents had accumulated at the house of the late Dr. Anster, Registrar of the Court, which, after his death, were removed and placed in presses in the present Court.

The fact of business having been transacted at private houses, and the Records having been kept in them, will account for their want of regularity in series. In the preparation for Transfer, it was found impossible to arrange them satisfactorily, but very soon I hope to be able to arrange and index the Cause Papers, so as to make them, so far as they exist. readily consultable.

It was not till the year 1867, on the creation of the new jurisdiction of the Court of Admiralty, that the present commodious Court and offices were finally provided for the accommodation of the Judge and his staff.

In my Report on the Records belonging to the Chancery Recognizance Office, dated 11th December, 1868, at page 63 of the appendix to your First Report, there is a note to the effect that in an inner room were four presses, filled with documents belonging to the Court of Admiralty, which had been tied up, labelled, and entered in our Transfer Book, but which were not removed when the Transfer of the Chancery Recognizances. &c., took place. These Documents were brought over and deposited in this office on the 27th April, 1869, but no Report was made on them. as it was deemed advisable that all the Records of the Court of Admiralty should be dealt with together. They consisted chiefly of Affidavits, Warrants, Orders (circa 1800-35); several bundles of Cause Papers for about the same period, the titles and dates of the causes being entered in the Transfer Book; Protocols 1805-14; 1825 and 1830-2; 27 vols. On 3rd August, 1874, in obedience to your instructions, I attended at the Court to prepare the contents of five presses in it for Transfer, which was effected on the following day. At the request of Judge Townsend, a Warrant to include all Documents connected with the old Court, up to its abolition in 1867 was issued, so that the following were transferred:-

Rule Books, (27 vols.), August, 1747 to 25th November, 1867. Note and Rough Books (11 vols.), 8th Feb., 1856, to 23rd Mar. 1864. Sales' Account Book, 1807 to 1823.

Eight Log Books, 1857-1867; lodged during the progress of Causes. Twenty-three parcels of Cause Papers, the titles of the principal Cause being given in the Transfer Book. Among these are

some parcels of Letters Remissory.

J. F. Hamerton, esq., the Queen's Proctor, having intimated that he had found some Records of the Court in his offices, at 61 Upper Sackvillestreet, they were examined and were transferred on 17th October, 1874. They consisted of Three Rule Books, May 1797 to September 1800; 11th October 1855 to 20th May, 1858; and 1st February, 1862, to 7th October, 1863, which fill up gaps in the series brought from the Court.

APPENDIX III

EXTRACT from the REPORT of JAMES H. DAVIES, Esq., on the removal of the RECORDS of the REVENUE AND EQUITY EXCHEQUER deposited in a VAULT beneath the Offices of MASTER FITZGIBBON.

The vault having undergone a thorough dusting and cleansing, I commenced proceedings, under your directions, on the 11th May. Owing to the crowded state of the vault, it was deemed advisable to carry on the actual transfer concurrently with the preparations. This was accordingly done, and on the 21st May, after some interruptions, I had the honour to report the deposit of the last load in the Record Treasury.

The Records of the Revenue Exchequer dealt with by me form a continuation of those previously removed to this office, and complete the series up to the year 1848; and as the Assistant Deputy Keeper, in his Report on the collection, has given full particulars of the nature and value of the different classes of documents, it would be useless for me to go over the same ground. I shall therefore ask leave to refer inquirers to that Report (see 2nd Report of Deputy Keeper, p. 61, Appendix 9).

The Equity Exchaquer Records deposited in this vault were of slight value, and without arrangement, with the exception of four bundles of Replications and Rejoinders put up by the late Mr. Ferguson. The centre of the vault was taken up by a large wooden stand, supporting files of Replications, Rejoinders, Orders, Names of Commissioners, and other Documents from the Filacer's office. This stand was removed to the vaults of the Record Treasury, each file being properly docketed and easy of access if required. I append a Schedule of the Records transferred, which must still undergo further listing and arrangement.

APPENDIX IV.

EXTRACT from REPORT of HENRY F. BERRY, Esq., on removal of RECORDS of LAW EXCHEQUER from the CHAMBER of the LORD CHIEF BARON.

The Lord Chief Baron having intimated that three presses in his Lordship's Chamber contained Records, these on examination were found to be Records of the Court of Exchequer, and I was instructed to prepare them for removal.

Twenty-five parcels were labelled, entered, and their transfer accomplished on 21st November, 1874; the Records were in no kind of order, and were very miscellaneous in their character. They seem to have belonged principally to the Rules Department of the Court, and consisted chiefly of the following:—

Issues and Verdicts, circa 1810–1826. Lists of Records at Assizes, ,, ,, Writs of Venire, with panels attached. Posteas, 1807.

The collection is lodged in Bay 5 I, at the end of the Law Exchequer series of Records.

APPENDIX V.

Copy Order of Lords Commissioners of the Great Seal of Ireland, 4th July, 1874.

Whereas, by the Chancery (Ireland) Act, 1867, section 29, it is enacted that whenever in the judgment of the Lord Chancellor, from the state of business in the Court, any Master whose office is by the said statute abolished, can be spared, it shall be lawful for the Lord Chancellor to release such Master from his duties as such, at such time as to him shall seem meet.

And whereas by the 2nd section of the same Act, the expression Lord Chancellor occurring therein shall mean and include the Lords Commissioners for the custody of the Great Seal of Ireland. And whereas in our judgment, having regard to the state of business in the said Court and in their respective offices, the Right Honorable William Brooke and Jeremiah John Murphy, esq., two of the said Masters, may be spared. We do hereby release the said William Brooke and Jeremiah John Murphy from their duties as such Masters from and after the 8th

day of August next ensuing.

And whereas the 39th section of the said Act directs the nature of the business to be prosecuted by the then Masters of the said Court until they should be removed by resignation, death, or otherwise, or released from their duties under the said Act; and that such business if necessary should from time to time be distributed among the Masters or such of them as should then remain, and the Receiver Masterin such manner as the Lord Chancellor should direct. And whereas it is enacted by the 175th section of the said Act as interpreted by the 2nd section thereof that all suits, causes, matters, or other proceedings which were pending in the said Court on the 1st day of Michaelmas Term, 1867, should be conducted or prosecuted according to the same practice as if the said Act had not passed; provided that it should be lawful for the Lord Chancellor by an order to be made upon motion or petition to direct that the whole or any part of the further proceedings in such suit, cause, or matter should thenceforth be carried on according to the practice introduced by the said Act. whereas all the business now carried on in the offices of the said two Masters has been carried on according to the former practice. Now we do hereby direct that all the business now transacted in the offices of the said two Masters which consists in the passing of the accounts of Receivers, Guardians, and Committee of the Estates of Lunatics, and in the management of the estates wherewith they are entrusted, shall, from and after the 8th day of August next be transferred to the office of the Receiver Master and that all other business now appertaining to the said two offices shall, from and after the said 8th day of August, be transferred to the Chambers of the Lords Commissioners; and it shall be competent for any person interested in the prosecution of any suit, cause, matter or other proceeding so transferred to make application to the Lords Commissioners in Chamber touching the regulation of the course of practice to be pursued in its further prosecution.

APPENDIX VI.

EXTRACT from REPORT of HENRY Cox, Esq., on the RECORDS (prior to 1850) TRANSFERRED from the Offices of J. J. Murphy, Esq., Ex-Master in Chancery.

The Offices consist of three rooms—viz., the Court, the Clerk's (or back) Office, and the Examiner's Office. The documents were distri-

buted in twenty-one presses.

In consequence of the limited space, and of the rapidity of accumulation, considerable confusion existed in the dates and sequences of the documents. This necessitated a much longer time for the preparation than was anticipated. I was engaged on this duty with the assistance of two workers and a writer for a total period of about six weeks.

The following are the several classes of documents removed :-

Cause Papers.—These comprise the papers lodged in about 3,000 causes, the titles of which were, during the preparation, entered on transfer sheets. The papers in matters of a later date were found to be tied in bundles, with their proper titles attached; but no order had been observed in putting them into their receptacles. In addition to these, there were 114 bundles of papers which, owing to the confusion of their arrangement in their pigeon-holes, could not be distributed into their various causes. As nearly as possible they were grouped into bundles commencing with the same letter, and are labelled "Miscellaneous Cause Papers."

Interrogatories and Depositions.—Of these there are 118 bundles. Intermixed with these were found a few Dominicals which, at this stage, it was not deemed necessary to separate from the Interrogatories with which they were previously arranged.

Miscellaneous Deeds, Leases, &c.—Of these there are sixty-two bundles. Under this general title are included Tenants' Leases, Mortgages, Marriage Settlements, Deeds of Surrender, Deeds of Attornment, Draft Conveyances, &c.

Miscellaneous Receivers' Accounts-Nine bundles.

Miscellaneous Notes of Sale—Four bundles. These appear to be minutes of the different biddings made for various lands set out according to the order of the Court. The dates range from 1791 to 1806.

Miscellaneous Rentals-Three bundles.

Miscellaneous Bills of Costs-One bundle.

Distraining Notices—One bundle.

Miscellaneous Stockbrokers' Accounts—Seven bundles. These are accounts of stock investments brought before the Master for his approval.

There was found one bundle of Lorenz and Recognizeness unevecuted.

There was found one bundle of Leases and Recognizances unexecuted with an index giving reasons for their non-execution.

Miscellaneous Documents—Consisting of fragments, &c., eleven bundles.

The Books comprise:

Official Day Books—Two volumes (1835-1843) with an index attached to the earlier volume.

Official Account Books—Nineteen volumes, with dates ranging from 1806 to 1839.

Masters' Note Books—Twenty-five volumes, with dates ranging from 1806 to 1846; but apparently there is a gap from 1836 to 1845. These books are not indexed, and seem to be merely rough notes for the Master's own information.

Sales and Letting Books—Three volumes, from Jan. 1818, to Oct. 1847. An index to each volume.

Summons and Attendance Books-Twenty-four volumes (1816-1845).

Guardians', Committees', and Receivers' Account Books—Two volumes, both indexed (1836-1847). Also one Receiver's Account Book (1792–1820) in cases, before Master Ellis, of minors and lunatics. Indexed.

Order Books—Two volumes, both indexed (1843-1851).

Short Cause Lists-Two volumes, commencing E. 1843.

Long Cause Lists—Two volumes, commencing E. 1843; and two volumes for 1848-9.

Merchants' Account Books Lodged as Exhibits-ninety-seven volumes.

Entry Book of Exhibits (1 vol.) in various causes, with an index of the causes. Latest entry 1806.

A MS. copy (bound) of Report on Inquiry held by the Surveyor-General, in 1818, into the condition of the Stationery Office.

SIR,—I beg leave to submit to your Honor my annual statement of the progress of the work done in the State Paper Department during the past year, viz:—1st February, 1874, to 1st February, 1875.

I. TRANSFER OF DOCUMENTS.

The following collections have been transferred to the Public Record Office:—

- 1. MINUTES OF PROCEEDINGS OF THE LINEN MANUFACTURE IN IRE-LAND.—1711-1828; 139 MS. volumes.
- Returns of all Schools in the various Parishes of Ireland.— 1824–1825.
- 3. Form of Answers Contained in Schedule to an Act, 52 Geo. III., entitled an Act for taking an account of the Population of Ireland, 1813-1814.

II.

RECEPTION OF THE STATE PAPERS.

1. The Papers of the Chief Secretary's Office.—1853 to 1864, inclusive—twelve complete years—have been received.

2. Papers and Books of the Four Courts Marshalsea have been, by direction of the Government, placed in the Record Tower.

III.

ARRANGEMENT, CLASSIFICATION, INDEXING, &c., OF STATE PAPERS.

1. THE PAPERS OF THE YEARS 1822, 1823, and 1824, have been arranged and placed in cartons. A Carton Catalogue has been made to each year and placed in the beginning of each Index.

An Index to the Miscellaneous Papers of these three years has been

commenced.

2. The Modern State Papers of the years 1853, 1854, 1855, 1856, 1857, 1858, 1859, 1860, 1861, 1862, 1863, and 1864, inclusive, which have been received from the Chief Secretary's Office, are a continuation of the series already deposited here. The Papers of these years fill 257 cartons, and number at a rough calculation about fifty or sixty thousand. All these documents have been regulated by being placed in cartons and by having a Carton Catalogue added to each year's Index.

Accompanying the Indexed Papers of these years is a large mass of unindexed "Miscellaneous Papers," which have been sorted and placed

in presses.

THE BOOKS AND PAPERS OF THE FOUR COURTS MARSHALSEA before mentioned as having been transferred to this department, have been

arranged and a Press Catalogue made to the series.

4. Petitions addressed to the Lord Lieutenant and Council, and other Papers connected with them, described in my last (6th) Report, are being carefully indexed. The progress is satisfactory, and the interest of this important collection will, when the Index is finished, be at once seen. The indexing has come down to No. 886 and the numbering to 8,123.

5. THE CALENDAR OF THE BRITISH DEPARTMENTAL CORRESPONDENCE, mentioned in my fifth Report as having been brought down to the year 1738, has been continued to 1739. The transcription of this calendar

has been proceeded with from 1714 to 1718.

It will be a source of infinite gratification to me, when the current business of this Department will permit us to accomplish the task of completing the Calendar of this British Departmental Correspondence, as the collection is full of historical materials having reference to a very interesting period.

6. A draft Index has been made to the MILITARY BOOKS OF ENTRIES

in this Department.

In consequence of the great mass of Papers of modern date received from the Chief Secretary's Office, there have arisen and there are continually arising searches for documents of current importance. These searches, of almost daily occurrence, involve a vast amount of investigation and cause a considerable expenditure of time, chiefly because the Papers of the various years (in incomplete bundles) are difficult of access, and also because several of the principal documents, taken out in past years for Governmental or official use, not having been restored to their proper places in the bundles, are not discoverable by means of the Indexes, and are only, if at all, to be found by an examination of the unindexed "Miscellaneous Papers." I have given this subject my earnest consideration, and have felt that it is one of the most urgent duties of this Department to make such arrangement of these State Papers as will surmount the difficulty and enable documents, when called for by Government, to be readily produced. I have consequently directed the whole of the Papers of the modern years to be sorted and placed in cartons, for, once they are so deposited, they can be referred to without trouble or delay. Good progress has been already made in the work, no less than fifteen years' arrangement under the plan having been completed; and I anticipate that within a short period the whole of these documents will be to a great extent in a state of facile reference. this moment the remaining portion of the old Parliamentary Record Room is being adjusted for the reception of the cartons required for this purpose.

APPENDIX VIII.

EXTRACT from MINUTES OF PROCEEDINGS OF TRUSTEES for the LINEN MANUFACTURE IN IRELAND.—Vol I. p. 1. (H. 54, I.)

His Grace the Duke of Ormond, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, having (pursuant to an Act of Parliament) appointed Trustees for the Linnen Manufacture, they were by his Grace's direction summoned to meet at the Castle of Dublin on Wednesday the 10th of October, 1711, where the Deed of their appointment was read to them, which is as follows:—

Whereas by Act of Parliament made in this Kingdom in the Ninth Year of Her Majesties Reign, entitled an Act to enforce such Acts as have been made for the Improvement of the Linnen Manufacture, and for a further regulation of the same, it is among other things enacted that the Lord Lieutenant or other Chief Governor or Governors of this Kingdom for the time being shall and may, and is thereby enabled to Nominate and appoint certain Trustees for the disposall and Management of the Duties granted by the said Act according to the Trusts and powers thereby vested in them to consist of an Equall Number of Persons out of Each of the four Provinces of this Kingdom, as by the said Act (Relation being thereunto had) more fully may appear. Now know

all men by these presents that I James Duke of Ormond Lord Lieutenant Generall and Generall Governour of Ireland, in pursuance and execution of the power vested in me by the said Act, Do by these presents appoint the Severall persons herein after named to be Trustees for the Disposall and Management of the Duties granted by the Said Act, according to the Trusts and powers thereby vested in them. That is to say the Right Honble. Sir Constantine Phipps Lord High Chancellor of the said Kingdom of Ireland, and such other person as shall be Chancellor for the time being-The most Reverend Father in God William Lord Arch Bishop of Dublin, Robert Earl of Kildare, Henry Earl of Drogheda, Arthur Earl of Anglesey, Lord Vict. Fitzwilliams, Thomas Lord Baron Howth, Robert Doyne esq. Lord Chief Justice of the Comon Pleas, Robert Rochfort esq. Lord Chief Baron of her Majesties Court of Excheqr., Charles Dering esq. her Majesties Auditor, Genll. Samuel Dopping esq., Sir Richard Levinge Knt. and Barrt. her Majesties Attorney Genll., Sir Pierce Butler Barrt., Sir William Fownes Knt., Stephen Ludlow esq., Thoms. Burgh esq., Anderson Saunders esq., John Pratt esq., all which Said persons are of the Province of Leinster.

APPENDIX IX.

EXTRACT from the REPORT of the Assistant Deputy Keeper on RECORDS RECEIVED in the Year 1874.

From the Record and Writ Office, Chancery, there were removed, on the 5th February, Cause Petitions under the Court of Chancery (Ireland) Regulation Act, 1850:—those on parchment, from 22nd August, 1850, to 9th August, 1851, and of those on paper, thirty Volumes, from 13th August, 1851, to 31st January, 1855. These latter are numbered consecutively, and each Volume contains 100 Petitions.

Also Answers (on parchment) to the Cause Petitions, from 6th January, 1851, to 31st December, 1851.

On the 4th March, 62 Volumes of the Answers and Affidavits in Cause Petition matters from 11th September, 1850, to 10th January. 1855.

Note.—Prior to 11th September, 1850, all Affidavits in Chancery were filed in the Chancery Affidavit Office, but on the passing of the Chancery (Ireland) Regulation Act of 1850, the Chancellor decided that the ordinary Affidavits under the Act should be filed in the Rolls Office,

along with the Answering Affidavits.

In 1860 this practice was altered, and all, except the Answering Affidavits, were filed from thenceforth in the Chancery Affidavit Office. In Causes under the 15th section of the Act the practice was to file the Answering Affidavit in the Master's Office, in the nature of a Discharge to the copy of the Petition previously filed in the same office. however, of the Answering Affidavits to Petitions under the 15th section have slipped in amongst these Affidavits.

There were transferred on 29th April the Cause Petition Index Books for the years 1851, 1852, 1853, 1854, the Volume for 1851 containing

all Cause Petitions filed from the earliest date to that year.

On 19th May, Accounts from 22nd December, 1851, to 29th December, 1854 (Vols. 171 to 262); Petitions, 6th December, 1851, to 31st December, 1854 (Vols. 89 to 120); Reports, 18th December,

1851, to 18th December, 1854 (Vols. 109 to 144).
On 4th June the Order or Full Entry Books, from (circa) 1852 to 1854 (Vols. 485 to 522)—Vol. 489 not transferred: it is either missing, or a mistake was made in the numbering. Rolls Motion Books, 13th January, 1852, to 13th December, 1854 (Vols. 321 to 363).

December, 1854 (Vols. 1 to 11).

APPENDIX X.

CALENDAR TO FIANTS OF KING HENRY VIII.

EXTRACT from PRELIMINARY OBSERVATIONS of J. J. DIGGES LATOUCHE, Esq., the Assistant Deputy Keeper of the Records.

The "Fiants," or Warrants to the Court of Chancery for Grants under the Great Seal, so called from their usually commencing with the words Fiant literae patentes, extend from the 12th year of Henry VIII. to the present time. They are comprised amongst the Records transferred to this department from the late Rolls Office of Chancery, where they had been deposited from time to time by the Clerk of the Hanaper, for the purpose of safe custody, and for facilitating the

enrolment of the Letters Patent grounded on them.

The present practice is not to issue Letters Patent to the parties entitled to them until the enrolment has been made upon the Patent Roll, for which purpose the Fiant is treated as the original, though the enrolment directed by the Act is of the Letters themselves. This practice has, I presume, prevailed since the 17 & 18 Charles II., chap. 2, known as the Act of Explanation, the 73rd section of which enacts that all Letters Patent of titles of honor, offices, or lands shall be void, unless they contain a clause of enrolment in the Chancery of Ireland within a time to be specified. Prior to this enactment, the causes operating to such enrolments as were made, were, I apprehend, the security thereby given to the grantee, and the obtaining of their customary fees on enrolment by the officers of the Court.

The whole number of Fiants for the reign of Henry VIII. appears, by an entry in an old book entitled, "Schedule of various Records from Henry VIII. to Elizabeth" (2 Q. 144. 1), being a receipt for Records, signed by George Norton, 15th November, 1633, to have been 565. Of these I have been able to calendar 548. In the Manuscript Catalogue prepared by the Record Commissioners there are noticed only 519; but this number I have been enabled to augment by the addition of some which the Commissioners had by mistake included in subsequent reigns; of some I found among the Records of the Palatinate of Tipperary; and of others found in a bundle labelled "Fiants of various dates" (1 L. 91. 1). I have also obtained the contents of a few others, which are entered as Fiants in the Books of Patents in the office of the Auditor-General.

Of the above, 365 are enrolled or marked as enrolled, but I found on the Patent Rolls only 242. This discrepancy exists chiefly in respect of Fiants for Leases.

The majority of the Fiants of Henry VIII. correspond with, and are similar in form to, the class of "Signed Bills" in the English Chancery, of which Mr. Brewer gives an example in the preface to his Calendar of "Letters and Papers, Foreign and Domestic, of Henry VIII.," p. xcix. In this country they must be divided into three classes—those signed by the King, those signed by the Lord Deputy, and those signed by other competent authority. The first class are for the most part identical with Mr. Brewer's example, a very few being without the petition, and one having the words, "Fiant litere domini Regis patentes in debita forma tenore verborum sequentium," inserted before the word "Rex" in the

granting portion. I give an example of the second class, as the form is, I think, peculiar to Ireland.

And this o, concordatum shalbe unto yow the lorde chauncelor a suffycient warrant to graunt the Kings matter brode seale upon the same. Yeoven at Dublin the xxviiith of January in the xxxviiith yere of the Raigne of o' soverayne lorde King Henry theight.

Nearly all these instruments have the date of their delivery into Chancery marked upon them in accordance with the Act 37°, Henry VI., cap. 1, directing that Warrants made to the Great Seal should have the day of their delivery to the Chancellor entered, and that the patents should bear the date of that day.

In the Calendar below, as most of the Fiants are written in Latin, I have in the margin marked those that are in English. The serial number is that of their present chronological arrangement, and the number in brackets gives their reference in the Record Commissioner's Catalogue. I have also added in the Record Commissioner's Catalogue the chronological serial number, that it may form a key for any person who has by him the old reference.

In conclusion, I beg to acknowledge the able assistance rendered me by Mr. Mills, on whom by much the more arduous portion of the labour
