DEPUTY KEEPER OF THE PUBLIC RECORDS

IN IRELAND.

TO THE MOST NOBLE JOHN, DUKE OF MARLBOROUGH, K.G.,
LORD LIEUTENANT-GENERAL AND GENERAL GOVERNOR OF IRELAND.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR GRACE,

1. The proceedings had in execution of the several Acts of Parliament now administered by this Office are presented to your Grace's notice under the respective heads of the enactments.

Proceedings under the Public Records (Ireland) Act, 1867.

Extern.

2. Records of the Court of Chancery, in continuation of the series previously deposited to the year 1856, have been received under the provisions for removal, from time to time, of accruing Records from the Superior Courts. Removal of accruing collections, Chancery.

3. The collections of the Consistorial Court of the Diocese of Dublin, Glendaloch, and Kildare have been received from the custody of the Registrars, J. H. and A. Samuels, esquires. For particulars of this collection I beg leave to refer to the Report of Mr. Mills, by whom the transfer was conducted. Removal of Dublin Consistorial collection. App. I.

4. The Keeper of the State Papers has transmitted 326 volumes, relating chiefly to the Military Establishment in Ireland, and comprising Entries, Reports, and Letters from A.D. 1696 to 1810. I beg leave to refer to the Annual Report of the Keeper in the Appendix, from which it appears that large consignments are in course of preparation for removal. Referring to the observation in my Eighth Report (par. 10 c.), that it is important, for the safety of the Record Treasury, that the use of cartons of inflammable material should be discontinued, I have the satisfaction to state that provision has been made for the substitution of zinc boxes, of the same pattern, for the cartons in which the State Paper collection has hitherto been transmitted. 5. The final deposit of the Pleadings of the former Equity side of the Court of Exchequer has been advanced from 1st January, 1763, to 31st December, 1807, comprising 9,426 books or *fasciculi* of Bills and Answers, and will be completed during the current year. Equity Exchequer Pleadings.

6. The deposit, in dictionary order, of the Cause Papers from the offices of the Right Hon. Wm. Brooke, formerly Master in Chancery, has been completed. It comprises the ancillary documents in 8,025 Causes. The deposit of the Cause Papers from the offices of J. J. Murphy, Esq., formerly Master in Chancery, has been commenced.

7. The Inventions-Patents continue to be placed in order, in a uniform course of deposit, as they are received.

8. The Ancient Pleadings of the Court of Chancery, which had been cleansed and flattened, have been arranged so far as legible dates exist upon them.

9. The Fiants for Letters Patent, from File 3 to File 59 of Charles I., have been cleansed, flattened, and placed in continuation of the earlier series in portfolios.

10. The Administration and Marriage Licence Bonds of the Dioceses of Connor and Kildare have been cleansed, flattened, and arranged.

11. In the Bookbinding Department, 18 volumes of Prerogative Will Books, 1 volume of Down Survey Maps, 1 volume of Lists of Inventories (Prerogative), and 1 volume of Lists of Administrations (Prerogative) have been rebound; and 125 membranes of Exchequer Pleadings, 64 Fiants, 10 Original Wills, 9 membranes of Patent Rolls, and 8 of Inquisitions have been cleansed and repaired.

12. *a.* A Consolidated Index to the Auditor-General's collection and other records removed from the Custom House, has been commenced, and brought down to p. 196. The like Index for the Records of the Court of Chancery has been continued to p. 173 of a second volume.

b. Indexes have been added to the following Will Books of the Diocese of Armagh, hitherto defective in that respect, for A.D. 1817-19; 1823-29; 1834-39; and have been compiled to the Original Wills of the Dioceses of Derry and Dromore; and an Index has been commenced for those of the Diocese of Down.

c. A copy has been made of the Indexes to the Prerogative Wills, Administrations, &c., letters A—E, A.D. 1831-40, the original being much injured by use; also of the Index to the Equity Exchequer Bill Book, 1773.

d. Steady progress has been made with the Index of Names and Places to Calendar of Patent Rolls, James I.

d. An Index to the *Liber Munerum Publicorum Hibernie*, one of the largest operations of this kind hitherto undertaken here, has been completed during the past year, and is presented to the public in an Appendix to this Report. The *Liber Hibernie* is the repertory of a vast quantity of record material bearing on the general and administrative history of Ireland. It comprises two imperial folio volumes extending to 1,757 pages of printed matter, produced at a cost to which its practical utility has not been at all commensurate. This miscarriage has arisen principally from the want of any Index; and the absence of an Index appears to be accounted for by the confused form of the compilation, which consists of several principal parts, each com-

hitherto

prising several subdivisions, and all having independent paginations. The constituent parts, although put together without due regard to order of time and sequence of subjects, are, to a great extent, works of high value and substantial accuracy, being in effect the MS. books compiled from the original records by Mr. Lodge, formerly Deputy Keeper of the Rolls and Keeper of the State Papers, purchased, after that learned gentleman's decease, by Government in 1785. The printing of the *Liber Munerum* was begun in 1812, and was continued in a desultory manner down to 1830; when, owing to the confused and unsatisfactory form of the work, its further continuance was stopped by order of the Irish Government. The value of the principal matter, however, having become apparent, the sheets were collected, and the work was issued from the Rolls House of England, 7th February, 1852, with a preface giving a history of its compilation and a short abstract of its contents. Its value to this office has been such that, notwithstanding the difficulty of dealing with matter so disjointed, the task of compiling an Index to it was undertaken by Mr. Gilbert, the former Secretary; and I have now to report the completion of his design, which has been executed at various times during the last three years, in the intervals of more pressing office business.

13. *a.* The Calendaring of the Disentailing Deeds Rolls of Chancery has been advanced from Deed 3,364, enrolled 10th October, 1857, to Deed 3,599, enrolled 21st December, 1858.

b. The Fiantis for the reign of Philip and Mary have also been calendared in continuation of the series for the preceding reigns published in my previous Reports. The Calendar, with its Index, is printed in the Appendix. Twenty Fiantis for Presentations, of this reign, which were in existence in 1633, are not now found amongst these bundles. It is possible that the researches of the Historical MSS. Commission may lead to the discovery of these and other missing records in the muniment rooms of families representing great officers of State, and other public servants who from time to time may have had occasion to refer to such evidences at their private mansions.

Proceedings under the Public Records (Ireland) Act, 1867, Objects of Act of 1875.
Amendment Act, 1875.

16. This enactment was passed for the purpose of removing doubts as to whether the Parochial Books and Documents of the late Established Church are records within the meaning of the principal Act, and to make provision for their gradual transfer to this office as they should be found, from time to time, to have passed into the hands of custodians other than those who had the possession of, and right of deriving emoluments from them, at the time of the disestablishment. As regards these former custodians the Act provided that, so long as they continue to discharge the duties, they shall retain possession; and it contained provisions for ascertaining the cesser of such discharge of duties in the several incumbencies, and for enabling the Master of the Rolls, in cases where entries had continued to be made in the old books after disestablishment, to allow these books to continue in the hands of such custodians as His Honor should nominate. It required the parochial officers to make returns of their records in such form as they should be directed to do, and invested his Honor with plenary powers for enforcing obedience.

17. In my Eighth Report (pars. 14, 15) I referred shortly to the proceedings taken by circulars and other communications with the parochial officers, to learn the number, nature, and bulk of the parochial records; but the returns not having been made at the end of the year 1875, I held over the detailed account of these proceedings for my present Report.

18. The objects sought to be attained by the issue of the first circular (A) were: to acquaint the parochial officers with the nature of the new legislation; and to ascertain (1) the nature and bulk of the collections for the reception of which provision should be made; (2) the custody on 31st December, 1870, so as to judge which of the records should be removed as being come into new custody, and which should remain in the hands of the old custodians; and (3) the cases in which new entries had been made in continuation of those in the books of the former establishment.

19. Two subsequent circulars (B and C) were issued for the purpose of explaining some matters of detail, and of expediting the return of the inventories.

20. The general result as appearing by the inventories returned from 1,363 Depositories, showed a total of 6,115 volumes (exclusive of Marriage Registers kept under 7 & 8 Vic., c. 81), of which 2,801 appertaining to 641 Depositories, appeared to be presently attachable, as having come into the hands of new custodians since the disestablishment.

Proceedings under Act of 1875 in 1876. Result of Inventories.

21. It appeared that the practice of continuing the entries had been in effect universal, and that continued entries had in very many cases been made on the back of the same folio containing the entries up to 31st December, 1870; so that there is no possibility, in these cases, of removing the earlier part of the books without also removing subsequent entries affecting the Church of Ireland. The Master of the Rolls, in this state of facts, was pleased to

direct that all the attachable collections should be removed in the first instance, and that parochial officers desiring to retain the custody of the continued books should make application under section 7 of the Act after removal.

22. It also appeared that in some few cases, although the Incumbency had changed, the custody remained in the hands of persons answering the description of parochial officers, as defined by sec. 4 of the Act, who had been intrusted with it by former Incumbents; and questions were raised and reserved for the decision of his Honor in these cases.

23. Excluding these last-mentioned cases, a warrant for the removal of the attachable portion of the collections was executed by the Right Honorable the Master of the Rolls, on the 15th May, 1876, and a circular (D) was addressed to the several parochial officers having charge of the records so attached, informing them that the servants of this office would proceed at a day of which they should have notice to remove their respective collections. Each circular contained a copy of the warrant, and of so much of the schedule incorporated therewith as affected the records in the particular custody.

24. Provision was made for the reception of these, as well as of the outstanding collections in continuing custodies, in the Record Treasury, by the erection of fire-proof fittings designed for their deposit in the dictionary order of the names of the parishes; so that, as they should come in from time to time, places might be ready for their reception. The attachable Depositories were laid down on sheets of the Ordnance Survey Map of Ireland, as a local guide to the servants of this office; and, by permission of the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, a limited number of Forms of Baptismal and Burial Entries, adapted for the Church of Ireland, were procured for the purpose of furnishing temporary substitutes for the books to be removed, in cases of exceptional inconvenience.

25. In this state of our preparations, in May, 1876, a Bill was introduced into the Commons House of Parliament for modifying the operation of the Act of 1875 in several important particulars. During the pendency of this measure it was judged proper to suspend further proceedings on his Honor's warrant.

26. The Bill in question having been withdrawn from the Commons, a measure grounded on it was introduced into the House of Lords, and eventually became law on the 11th August, 1876.

27. By this Act (sec. 4) the Parish Vestry Books, unless where they contain entries relating to baptisms, marriages, or burials, are declared not to be records, and will, consequently, be excepted from the operation of his Honor's warrant; and, by sec. 5, his Honor is further empowered to permit Parochial Records to remain in the custody of any rector, vicar, or curate of the Church of Ireland, on being satisfied by reports to be obtained from officers

to be nominated, at his Honor's request, by the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland, that the records are kept in fit and secure buildings, and due provision made for their custody.

28. It being considered that the rights of the continuing custodians in possession prior to 31st December, 1870, remain unaffected by this legislation, they have not been addressed in reference thereto; but no time was lost in apprising the Parochial Officers named in his Honor's warrant of the opportunity thus afforded them of retaining possession, on showing that their records are kept in the manner required. With this object a further circular (E) was issued, enclosing a form of return by which his Honor might judge provisionally of the fitness and security of the buildings, and accommodation provided; his Honor considering that the public ought not to be put to the expense of an inspection and report by the officer of the Board of Works, unless where a *prima facie* case of security should appear. The same occasion was taken to apprise the Parochial Officers of the exception of Vestry Books of the kind referred to from his Honor's warrant, and returns were requested in a form enclosed, showing in what cases the Vestry Books come within, or are excluded from the operation of the Act. As a general rule, these latter forms have not been filled up or returned; and it will be necessary to remove or leave the Vestry Books, where due provision shall not have been made for continuing custody, accordingly as they shall appear on inspection, at the time of removal of the other books, to fall within the statutable description or not.

29. With respect to the more important returns, as to the fitness and security of the buildings, &c., many Parochial Officers expressed dissatisfaction at being called on to make preparations for the better custody of their records without specific directions as to the nature of the buildings, &c., required, or assurance that, when provided, these preparations would meet the approval of the inspecting officer. It was not possible for the Master of the Rolls to foresee what the judgment of the officer of the Board of Works might be in particular cases, and his Honor considered that in all cases his final judgment should be reserved till that officer's report should be before him; but his Honor did not object to my offering the Parochial Officers such advice and suggestions as might appear to me likely to lead, as far as might be practicable, to the safe retention of the records in their proper parishes. With this view a further circular (F) was transmitted to the several custodians whose primary returns disclosed modes of custody not deemed sufficient to justify an inspection, together with the copy of a letter which had been addressed by me to a Parochial Officer, in reply to a request for information as to what arrangements would be considered sufficient. I had been early impressed with the importance of the depository being fixed, for which purpose it was considered that a safe capable of being made a permanent fixture was most suitable, and that a moveable box could not be so recognised. I accordingly intimated that on a return showing a fire-proof safe built permanently into the masonry of a vestry, assuming the

30. It appeared, however, to many of the custodians that their own residences would be preferable places of deposit; and on their views in this respect being placed before the Master of the Rolls, his Honor was pleased, on a full consideration of the question, to determine that, where such residence is the Parochial Manse, it may, notwithstanding its being an inhabited house, be considered a fit and secure building within the meaning and intention of the Act; and, accordingly, it has been intimated to all Parochial Officers so desiring, that, on their returning a fire-proof safe erected as a permanent fixture either in the vestry, as at first suggested, or in the Parochial Manse, an inspection will be called for.

31. No return has been made of any attachable records being kept in a strong-room, or fire-proof chamber; but it is understood that a few such repositories exist, and, in these instances, inspections will be called for without further provision for the security of the records.

32. It is necessary in the public interests that, as far as possible, the expense of sending officers more than once into the same district should not be incurred; and, up to the present time, all the arrangements of this Office have been made with a view to one uniform inspection for which it is proposed to issue his Honor's requisition to the Commissioners of Public Works directly on the coming in of the final returns, the time for which, in the cases of Depositories included in his Honor's Warrant, has been extended to the 21st February, 1877.

33. In my next Report I shall trace the effect of this Act in expunging from the Warrant those cases in which the provisions for safe custody may justify his Honor in making orders of retention; and hope to report the removal of the residue of the collections therein comprised, the custody of which shall not have been duly provided for, to this Office, where proper lists will be kept for informing inquirers where they are to resort for certified extracts.

34. In the extended correspondence to which these directions of the Legislature have led, I have found very general willingness on the part of the Parochial Officers to make the execution of the Acts as little troublesome to this Office as possible; and in two instances only have to report refusals—one absolute, the other constructive—to return inventories. The Parochial Officers who exhibited this disregard of the Act, have rendered themselves liable to imprisonment; but it is hoped that, when they consider their isolation among so many who have willingly obeyed the law, they will, without further pressure, comply with the requisitions which have been addressed to them.

35. The literary inquiries during the year embraced Wills, Grants of Land, Down Survey Maps, Memoranda Rolls, Journals and Records of the House of Lords, Faculty Books, Parochial Returns, Documents relating to History of County Sligo,

Chancery Bills and Decrees, State Papers, Quit Rent Books, Inquisitions, Documents relating to Ecclesiastical Affairs, Distribution Books, Philadelphia MSS., Rolls of Adventurers, &c., &c.

36. I have to acknowledge with thanks the receipt during the past year of eight volumes of Record Publications, sent as donations to this Office by directions of the Master of the Rolls in England. The Right Honorable William Brooke, formerly Master in Chancery, has also presented to this office a volume of Proceedings in Chambers in Chancery, *tempore* Lord Chancellor Jocelyn, 1750-51, formerly in the custody of the Earl of Roden.

APPENDIX I.

EXTRACT from the REPORT of JAMES MILLS, Esq., on the TRANSFER of the RECORDS of the CONSISTORIAL COURTS of DUBLIN, GLAND-
DELAGE, and KILDARE.

SIR,—That portion of the Records of these Courts which had become Records of the Court of Probate, was transferred to this Office in the year 1871, as mentioned in your Fourth Report, p. 11. They consisted of—Original Wills, some miscellaneous Testamentary Papers, Grant Books (containing entries of Grants of Probate and Administration, and, to the 31st December, 1830, Marriage Licenses), Will Books, Marriage License and Intestate Bonds, of the Diocese of Dublin; Wills, Renunciations, Bonds, Will Books, Grant Book and Caveat Book of the Diocese of Kildare; all extending, so far as they are perfect, down to 1858, when the Probate jurisdiction of the Ecclesiastical Courts expired.

A warrant of the Master of the Rolls was signed on the 7th July, 1876, for the transfer of certain Records, Books, and Documents of the Metropolitan and Consistorial Courts of Dublin, Glandelagh, and Kildare, as records of Courts and public offices which have ceased to exist. Under this warrant, and your instructions, I examined and prepared for transfer during seven days, between the 13th and 26th of July, the following Records:—

Cause Papers, about 1717 to 1868, containing papers in about 1,200 causes, in good order, and for the most part labelled with the name of each cause. These, for convenience of transfer, were grouped into 132 pieces.

These Records were removed to the Public Record Office on the 27th and 28th July, 1876, and deposited in Bay 4 N.

A considerable collection of documents still remains in the custody of the Registrar, respecting which it may become necessary to take further directions.

APPENDIX II.

To the Right Honorable the MASTER OF THE ROLLS—THE NINTH REPORT of SIR BERNARD BURKE, C.B., Ulster, Keeper of the State Papers in the Record Tower, Dublin Castle, dated the 1st February, 1877.

SIR,—In my last Report I drew your Honor's attention to the want under which we suffer of a comprehensive arrangement of the modern State Papers, continuously transferred in vast numbers from the Chief Secretary's Office to my department. The accomplishment of such an arrangement has now become one of urgent necessity, not only for the purpose of speedily answering Governmental inquiries—frequently of great importance—addressed to me, but also for the purpose of rendering the production of documents prompt and certain. The carrying out of this arrangement, and consequent indexing, have obliged me to suspend other work of not so pressing a nature.

I have mentioned that the documents transferred from the Chief Secretary's Office, ranging from 1700 to 1831 (with some few of earlier dates), were sent in two masses, one of them having a voluminous index, the other mass of papers being without any; and that I have compiled a draft index for current use.

The current papers commencing with the year 1821, being a continuation of the series of documents just referred to, extend to 1864; the more recent papers remaining for daily use in the office of the Chief Secretary. I have already stated, in former Reports, that these documents are such as concern the daily progress of the public business of the State. They comprise the correspondence referring to crime and outrage, the conduct of the Police and Magistracy, the pensions to public officers, concordatums, appointments to offices, corporations and colleges, fisheries, hospitals, law courts, prisons, sheriffs, &c. In continuation of the work of indexing, mentioned in my Report of last year, the documents belonging to the years 1821, 1822, 1823, 1824, and 1827, have been indexed in slips—the years 1825 and 1826 having been completed as in previous Report mentioned, and the displaced documents of each year

have been restored to their proper places—a work of no small labour. For the reception of the cartons destined for these documents, the Birmingham Tower-room has, during the past year, been prepared. I anticipate that within the next two years the remaining portion of the series will be indexed.

The transcription of the CALENDAR OF THE BRITISH DEPARTMENTAL CORRESPONDENCE has been proceeded with from 1719 to 1737, which nearly completes the second volume of the Calendar. It includes the letters of the Duke of Bolton during his lieutenancy, which comprised the years 1719 and 1720. Among other topics of historical interest we find in these letters details concerning the attainted Duke of Ormonde, and the case of *Annesley v. Sherlock*, so much connected with the history of the claim of legislative independence. On the 14th January, 1719, the Lord Lieutenant gives the Lords Justices instructions for the capture of “the late Duke of Ormond,” His Majesty having received an account that the Duke “after a short stay at Madrid is actually embarked from Spain with intent to land in Ireland, in order to excite a rebellion,” and directs them to issue a proclamation offering a reward of £1,000 for his seizure.

Subsequently, however, on the 27th of same month he approves of the Lords Justices enforcing by proclamation the Act of Parliament which offers a reward of £10,000, His Grace not having been apprized of the Act when he wrote previously.

On the 26th March, 1720, the Lord Lieutenant approves of the Lords Justices’ conduct in prohibiting a reprint of a book lately published in London and sent over to Ireland, entitled, “A History of the Rebellion and Civil Wars in Ireland, &c,” said to have been written by Lord Clarendon, which their Excellencies considered of a seditious nature.

In the lieutenancy of Bolton’s successor—the Duke of Grafton—occurs the correspondence for the obtaining of tall Irish Grenadiers for the King of Prussia. H. Walpole, the Duke’s secretary, writes on the 6th August, 1720, to Mr. Belcher for twenty or thirty men of an extraordinary size, whether Protestants or Papists, to be raised in Ireland, at the recommendation of Lord Stanhope, to be presented by His Majesty to the King of Prussia.

The correspondence of the same period has much about the danger of the plague, the enlisting of soldiers in Ireland for France and Spain, and the rumours of a rebellion to be raised in England in favour of the Pretender. During the lieutenancy of the next viceroy, Lord Carteret, there are his letters in 1728, concerning the building of the new Parliament House (now the Bank of Ireland), according to the plan of Captain Edward Lovett Pearce.

In the papers of the Duke of Dorset’s lieutenancy, there is on 30th May, 1732, a letter of His Grace to the Lords Justices concerning Sir Edward Pearce’s scheme for employing part of the foot forces in Ireland to make a navigable canal from Lough Neagh to Newry—since effected—together with correspondence concerning the unlawful raising of soldiers in Ireland for French or Spanish service.

The indexing of the PETITIONS addressed to the Lord Lieutenant and Council, and other papers connected with them, described in my Sixth Report, has been continued to No. 1,276.

The contents of two large Boxes, containing a mass of papers and books, ranging from about 1786 to 1808, have been partly classified. Having found that these papers are similar to those alluded to in my last Report as “a collection ranging over the years 1796 to 1805,” I intend to have the two collections arranged under one index.

The following Books of Entries, civil and military, have, during the past year, been transferred to the Public Record Office :—

I.—“CIVIL AFFAIRS.”—1697–1746 ; 26 MS. vols. These are the books of the Chief Secretary’s Office, and contain entries of Warrants of the Lords Lieutenants and Lords Justices, for the Payment of Moneys, Apprehension of Prisoners, Appointments, Pardons, Pensions, and Com-mittals ; Grants of Lands, Peerages, Ecclesiastical Presentations, Fairs and Markets, Swearing in of Bishops, Administering Oaths, Free Schools, Oyer and Terminer, Proclamations, &c., &c.

II.—“CIVIL PETITIONS.”—1696–1749 ; 45 MS. vols. These petitions are addressed to the Lords Lieutenants and to the Lords Justices, and are in many cases accompanied by certificates, &c. The references to, and the reports by, Law Officers, Judges, Archbishops of Dublin and Armagh, Commissioners of the Revenue and Forfeitures, Surveyors-General, and various other authorities, are also entered in these books. These petitions are distinct from the great mass of original petitions which I have described in my Sixth Report. They contain much valu-able information, and refer to various subjects of public interest, such for instance, as Forfeitures of Lands, Ejectments for the Recoveries of Lands, Claims of Discoveries, Payment for bringing Witnesses against Claims not to be comprehended within the Articles of Limerick, Claims for Ground, the Cutting down of Woods, French Protestants, Briefs for Collections for Losses sustained by plunder, fire, &c. ; Fairs and Markets, Exemption from Duty or Customs, Protections, Manors, Relief, Pardons, Reprieves, Leave of Absence, various Military Matters, such as Half Pay of Officers ; Clothing of Regiments, Accounts, &c., &c.

III.—“COUNTRY LETTERS.”—1701–1748 ; 37 MS. vols: Letters from the Lords Lieutenants and Lords Justices, and their secretaries, dated from Dublin Castle to various civil and military functionaries, such as Lord Mayors, the Commissioners of the Revenue, Governors of Counties and Forts, High Sheriffs, the Auditor-General or his Deputy, Com-manding Officers, Judges of Assize, Officers of the Ordnance, Com-manders of Ships. These letters refer to a great variety of subjects, such for instance, as Forfeitures, Pensions, Enlistment for Foreign Service, Outlaws, Quarantine, Prosecutions, Transportation, Appoint-ments—Civil and Military, Enlistment for the Pretender, Outrages, Piracy, Rapparees and Tories, Butlerage and Prizage, Popish Priests, Recommendations, Calling out of the Militia, Courts Martial, Appre-hending of Robbers, French Privateers, Maiming of Cattle, Embarka-tion of Troops, Landing of Scotch Rebels, Tories and Rapparees.

IV.—“KINGS’ AND QUEENS’ LETTERS AND REPORTS.”—1697–1748. These are entries of Kings’ and Queens’ Letters, and are distinct from the original Kings’ and Queens’ Letters to which an index has been made, and which were transferred to the Public Record Office. They refer to Hospitals and Free Schools, Pensions, Levy Money, Appoint-ments, the Encouragement of the Discovery of Concealed Forfeitures. There are also Petitions entered in these volumes.

V.—“SAILING ORDERS.”—1702–1746 ; 11 MS. vols. These are Warrants from the Lords Lieutenants and Lords Justices, for the sail-ing of Her Majesty’s ships, directed to the Commanders, &c.

VI.—“WARRANT BOOKS.”—1711–1786 ; 22 MS. vols. These vol-umes contain orders for the payments of moneys, &c.

VII.—“DOCKETS OF PRIVY SEALS,” marked “M. 4.”—1703-1712.

VIII.—“LETTER BOOKS INTO ENGLAND.”—7 MS. vols. ; 1711-1786. These are letters from the Lord Lieutenant and Council to the Principal Secretary of State in England, exclusively confined to transmitting heads of Bills, under the Great Seal, both public and private, to be proposed in Parliament.

IX.—“LETTER BOOKS OUT OF ENGLAND,” marked A., B., and C.—1711-1782 ; 3 MS. vols. These are Letters and Warrants from the Queen and the Secretary of State in England, to the Lord Lieutenant and Council in Ireland, for payments out of the Revenue, Swearing in and Removing of Privy Councillors, for the issuing of Proclamations, for the Regulating of Foreign Coin, Directing Forms of Prayer and Thanksgiving, Orders for the Observance of Fasts, Correspondence concerning the Dispute about the Electing the Lord Mayor of Dublin, about Enlisting Men for the Pretender, for Extraordinary Payments to be made by Concordatum. Of this last the following may serve as a specimen :—

These books contain a great quantity of information concerning Military affairs, and refer to subjects such, for instance, as Pay of Regiments, Officers’ Widows, Deserters, Battle-axe Guards, Court Martials, Half Pay of Officers, Army Agents, Accounts, Array Warrants, Ammunition and Stores, Fortifications, &c., &c.

XV.—“MILITARY ESTABLISHMENT.”—1682–1728 ; 1 vol.

XVI.—“CLOTHING BOOK.”—1718–1745 ; 1 vol.

SIR.—Herewith you have annexed (Schedule A) an extract from the "Public Records (Ireland) Act, 1867, Amendment Act, 1875," 38 & 39 Vic., c. 59, by section 12 of which you will observe that every Parochial Officer shall be bound to return to the Master of the Rolls in Ireland a complete and true inventory of all Records in his possession, custody, or care, in such form as the Master of the Rolls shall direct, within three months after he shall be directed so to do.

You will also observe that, by section 13, every Parochial Officer having the custody and care of any Record shall, if at any time during his life he ceases to discharge his duties in the church or chapel or parish with which such Record was connected, give notice thereof to the Master of the Rolls.

You are respectfully invited to give your aid and co-operation in carrying the provisions of the Act into effect, so as to ensure the ultimate deposit of the Records of the late Established Church of Ireland in the Public Record Office of Ireland.

The accompanying Form of Inventory has been approved by the Master of the Rolls, and his Honor directs that you will have the goodness, at your earliest convenience, to return same filled up as nearly in accordance with the Specimen Inventory (Schedule B), hereto annexed, as the nature of the case will permit. You will find the Form enclosed in the accompanying prepaid envelope directed to the Master of the Rolls at this address.

You will also find annexed (Schedule C) the Form in which, in the event of your ceasing to discharge the duties, as in section 6 mentioned, notice thereof may be given by you under the provisions of section 13.

I am further instructed to state that Records, while remaining in their original custody, are rarely endorsed or entitled so as to denote the parish

or office to which they belong; and I am, by his Honor's directions, to beg that you will have the goodness, in order to ensure certainty and uniformity in this respect, to place on the upper outside cover of each volume, or conspicuously on each other piece in your custody, one of the enclosed Adhesive Labels, filled up in accordance with the Specimen Form of Label (Schedule D) annexed.

SCHEDULE A.

4. In this Act—

The expression "parochial officer" shall be taken to mean any rector, vicar, curate, parish clerk, or other parish officer of the Church of Ireland, holding such office on the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and any person who after the said date discharged, or at the present time discharges, or who may hereafter discharge duties similar or analogous to the duties which such parochial officer then discharged:

The term "record" shall mean any diocesan or parochial record, minute of proceedings, paper, book, document, or registry, of or relating to any baptism, marriage, burial, or ordination, or other diocesan or parochial matter of a public nature, which, on the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, was in the possession or custody of any parochial officer:

The expression "Master of the Rolls" shall mean the Master of the Rolls for the time being in Ireland:

The expression "Record Office" shall mean the Public Record Office of Ireland.

5. Every record shall, from and after the passing of this Act, be under the charge and control of the Master of the Rolls, in the name and on behalf of Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, subject to the provisions relating to their care and custody hereinafter contained.

6. Any record which on the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, was in the custody and care of a parochial officer shall continue in the custody and care of such person, provided that he now continues, and so long as he shall hereafter continue, to discharge the same or similar duties in the church or chapel or parish with which such record was connected. As to all other records, and also as to the said records, when such parochial officer shall cease in such church or chapel or parish to discharge the said duties, the Master of the Rolls shall, as soon as conveniently may be, issue warrants directed to the several persons having the care of any record or records, ordering such persons to allow the same to be removed from its or their present place of custody, and deposited in the Record Office; and every such warrant shall be kept among the public records in the custody of the Master of the Rolls, and shall be a sufficient warrant for the removal of such record or records as shall be specified therein.

7. In case, since the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, entries of marriages, baptisms, burials, or other matters shall have been continued in the same book which had been in use for the purpose before the said date, it shall be lawful for the Master of the Rolls to make a special order in relation to such book, and thereby to authorise the custody and care of such book to be retained by any person whom he shall by such order authorise, and such person shall on accepting such custody and care be bound to take care thereof.

11. Until removal to the Record Office, pursuant to the provisions of this Act, every Record shall remain in the custody and care of the parochial officer

12. Every parochial officer shall be bound to return to the Master of the Rolls a complete and true inventory of all records in his possession, custody, or care, in such form as the Master of the Rolls shall direct, within three months after he shall be directed so to do.

13. Every parochial officer having the custody and care of any record shall, if at any time during his life he ceases to discharge his duties in the church or chapel or parish with which such record was connected, give notice thereof to the Master of the Rolls; and every registrar of deaths in Ireland, on receiving notice of the death of any parochial officer, shall forthwith transmit by post to the Master of the Rolls a certificate under his own hand of such death, with the particulars of the time and place of death, and on receipt of such certificate the Master of the Rolls shall transmit to the said registrar of deaths the cost of such certificate and transmission.

15. If any parochial officer shall neglect to furnish such inventory when so required, or do any other act in violation of the provisions and directions of this Act, he shall be guilty of contempt, and shall and may be proceeded against by order of the Master of the Rolls as if he had disobeyed a judicial order made by him in a cause.

SIR,—Referring to the several communications which have been addressed to you from this office in relation to the Parochial Records in your custody, I am instructed to inform you, that under the annexed provisions of the Parochial Records Act, 1876 (during the pendency of which measure it was not deemed expedient further to proceed in the execution of the warrant lately issued for removal of said Records), some alterations have been made in the previous law, viz. :—

I. Marriage Register Books kept pursuant to the provisions of the Act for Marriages in Ireland, 7 & 8 Vic., c. 81, are not to be removed to this office.

II. "Vestry Books," unless where they contain entries relating to baptisms, burials, or marriages, are not to be removed to this office. It therefore becomes necessary to request, and the Right Honorable the Master of the Rolls hereby directs that you will, *without delay*, return the enclosed Supplementary Inventory as regards any Vestry Book or Books in your charge, stating whether or not any such entries are therein contained, in order that such Vestry Book or Books, if not containing such entries, may be excluded from said warrant.

III. In addition to the power given to the Right Honorable the Master of the Rolls by section 7 of the Parochial Records Act, 1875, to permit the retainer of books containing entries in continuation of the entries made during the existence of the late Established Church (see first Circular from this office, Appendix A), his Honor is enabled, under section 5 of the present Act, to permit Parochial Records to remain in the care of any Rector, Vicar, or Curate of the Church of Ireland in the parish to which such Records belong, on being satisfied that fit and safe accommodation has been provided for said Records, and due provision made for their future custody. You will observe that his Honor must be so satisfied on a report to be obtained from an officer nominated, on his Honor's request, by the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland.

In case the Records in your charge are kept in such fit and safe building, and due provision made for their safe custody, and you desire that they should be permitted to remain in the parish, under the provisions referred to, you will be pleased to fill up and sign the enclosed Form of Application to the Right Honorable the Master of the Rolls, and transmit it to this office not later than the 1st December next. You need not be at the trouble of paying postage.

EXTRACT FROM THE PAROCHIAL RECORDS ACT, 1876.

(39 & 40 Vic., c. 58.)

4. The term "record" in the Public Records (Ireland) Act, 1867, Amendment Act, 1875, shall not mean or be held to apply to any marriage register book

kept pursuant to the provisions of "the Act for Marriages in Ireland" (7 & 8 Vic., c. 81), nor to any vestry books which contain entries exclusively relating to matters other than baptisms, burials, and marriages; and in any cases where such books have been removed by order of the Master of the Rolls they shall be committed by a further order of the Master of the Rolls to the charge of any rector, vicar, or curate of the said church in the parish to which such records belong.

5. The Master of the Rolls may, if satisfied by a report or reports to be from time to time made to him on his request by one of their officials nominated in that behalf by the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland (the said Commissioners being hereby authorized and required on the request of the Master of the Rolls to obtain such report or reports) that "records" are kept in fit and safe buildings, and that due provision is made for their safe custody, order and permit the same to remain in the care of any rector, vicar, or curate of the said church in the parish to which such records belong; and may, in the case of parishes where records have been removed by the Master of the Rolls before this Act, if satisfied by such report as aforesaid that fit and safe accommodation has been provided for said records, and due provision made for their future custody, order said records to be committed to the charge of any rector, vicar, or curate of the said church in the parish to which such records belong: Provided always, that the Master of the Rolls may at any time, if satisfied that any records permitted to be retained or committed to such charge as aforesaid under this section are kept in unfit and unsafe buildings, or that due provision is not made for their safe custody, as soon as conveniently may be, issue warrants directed to the several persons having the care of any such record or records, ordering such persons to allow the same to be removed from its or their place of custody, and deposited in the Record Office; and such records shall in all particulars be regarded as within all the provisions of the Public Records (Ireland) Act 1867, Amendment Act, 1875, and the orders made in relation thereto shall have the same effect, and be attended with the same consequences, as if made under this Act.

6. Every rector, vicar, or curate to whose custody any such records shall be entrusted under the provisions of this Act, shall once in every year make a report to the Master of the Rolls, at such time and in such form as the Master of the Rolls shall from time to time prescribe, touching the condition and the safety of the records so entrusted to him, and of the building in which the same are kept.

SIR,—Referring to your return (No. 2 to Circular E) received on the , I am instructed to apprise you that the provision for the safe custody of the Parochial Records in your charge appears to be insufficient, and that the said Records (save as excepted by the Act of last Session) will be removed under the warrant of which you have had notice, unless before the 31st January, 1877, you shall send in a further Statement (Form enclosed) that other arrangements have been actually* completed which shall appear to the Master of the Rolls to be such as will justify his Honor in desiring an inspection and report by the officer of the Board of Works.

As to what arrangements will ultimately be deemed sufficient, I beg leave to refer you to the enclosed copy of a letter addressed by the Deputy Keeper to a parochial officer desiring information on that subject, and to state that no arrangements less complete than those there indicated will be likely to receive his Honor's sanction.

I have also to request your special attention to the provision of the Act which renders it necessary that the place of deposit should be in the parish, and that the custodian should be the Rector, Vicar, or Curate.

DEAR SIR,—In reply to your letter of the I beg to request your attention to the provisions of the Parochial Records Act, 1876, extracted in Circular E, forwarded to you from this office. You will observe that the action of the Master of the Rolls must be grounded on reports from the proper officers of the Board of Works. This office cannot anticipate what these reports, in particular cases, may be. The best aid I can give you is to say that a fire-proof box would not, in my opinion, afford the necessary security for the records; and that, were I in your place, I would procure a fire-proof iron safe, and build it permanently into the masonry of the vestry, assuming that the vestry stands detached from inhabited houses, and is adequately heated and ventilated; but I cannot answer for what the officer may consider sufficient. I may say, however, that if you make your return, not later than 31st January, 1877, stating that such arrangements as I have indicated have been made, I have no doubt his Honor will include your case among those calling for inspection by the officer, and would suppose that a favourable report and order should follow.
