DEATH OF THE REV RICHARD T. TRACEY, M.A.

We much regret to announce the demise which took place this morning at his residence, 62 Catherine-street, of the Rev Richard Taylor Tracey, M.A., who, by many years, had been the oldest minister in the Wosleyan Methodist Church. He might almost be said to have been a centenarian, being only fifteen months under that The deceased was born in patriarchial age. January, 1791, and belonged to an old and highly esteemed Limerick family. Ordained in 1817, his first circuit was in Oldcastle, and for fifty years he was actively engaged in the ministry in numerous towns in Ireland. In 1839 hecame to Limerick, where he was located for two years, and on being made a Supernum-rary in 1866, took up his permanent abode in this city. For -ome time subsequent to this he was connected with the Methodist Church at Ennis; but for many years back had retired from active life. He was a link connecting Limerick with the time before the Union, and of course had a recollection of the time when we had neither railways, steamers, nor our penny postal system. The rev. gentleman was possessed of a very gentle and entertaining manner, and his an-ecdotes of bygone days were always characteristic of a clear and almost unimpaired memory. He preserved his great faculties up to the last, and a week or so ago saw him taking his daily walk Park. Mr to the will Tracey was a familiar figure, who long be missed in this city, and though called to his rest in the fulness of years his death is sincerely lamented by all who knew him or heard of his long and faithful service in the church. The remains will be interred on Saturday morning at St Mary's Cathedral, funeral leaving at 8.30 o'clock.

DEATH OF LORD FITZGERALD.

Lord Fitzgerald died yesterday at the residence in Dublin, of his brother, Mr T. Fitzgelald, solicit r. His lordship came over from England some time since to spend the summer with his relatives in this country. He was attacked by fever. John David Fitzgerald, Baron Fitzgerald, was one of the sons of Mr David Fitzgerald, a well-known merchant. Called to the bar in the year 1836, he went the Munster Circuit, rose with almost un qualled rapidity to the front of his profession, took silk in nine years from his call, and as a Queen's Counsel led the Munster circuit, displacing in his leadership the late Jonathan Henn, whose silvery eloquence did not make him a match for the skill and pliancy of his younger rival.
